## Review of past year

### **Online Events**

After the success of our 2021 international seminar series in 2021, we ran a second series in early summer 2022.

Seminar 1: (24 May 2022) Nonhuman matters/Nonhumans matter: Plants, food systems and the production of health Dr Sarah Elton, Toronto Metropolitan University, Canada.

Seminar 2:(20 June 2022) **Teenage girls and the entanglement with online porn: a new feminist materialist perspective** Professor Deevia Bhana, University of KwaZulu-Natal, South Africa.

Seminar 3: (26 September 2022) Whores, hijabs and heart emojis: intersectional explorations of youth's sexualized and racialised online assemblages Dr Kim Ringmar Sylwander, Malmo University, Sweden.

#### In-person event

In September 2022, the group organised an in-person/hybrid symposium, in conjunction with Nottingham Trent University Department of Social Work, Care and Community, entitled: *How may the material turn theorise individuals in neoliberal contexts?* This featured three papers by group members:

Paper 1: Reconsidering precarity through affect theory. Amanda Light, Ulster University.

Paper 2: *To resist is to invent: rethinking theories of social movements.* Angharad Beckett and Tom Campbell, University of Leeds.

Paper 3: *Politics of a pandemic: a more-than-human analysis*. Nick J Fox, University of Huddersfield.

#### **BSA** conference

The group took responsibility once again for convening the Theory stream at the 2023 BSA Annual Conference. The stream was very buoyant with papers presented in all nine of the paper sessions.

In addition, we organised the Theory stream plenary, with invited speaker Professor Gabrielle Ivinson (Manchester Metropolitan University), who spoke on the topic: '*Rethinking the sociology of horizontal knowledge: Basil Bernstein meets Gilbert Simondon'*.
